LETTER FROM THE PREZ

We had another weekend of great weather for this year's Louisville Blues-n-Barbecue Festival at the Water Tower in mid-July. Approximately 12,000 people attended the three days festival with Saturday having the best turnout. Thanks again to Larry Bisig, Jennifer Washle, Missy, Cosmo and all of the crew at Bisig Impact Group for another fantastic weekend of blues. Kudos to all of the musicians who contributed and welcome to the 21 new and renewing members who joined the weekend of the fest. I'm already looking forward to next year.

We're getting ready to hit the high point in the festival season with no less than four blues festivals in our area in the month of August. The Kentucky Blues Society in Bowling Green is hosting a one day festival on Saturday, August 4. Details can be found at www.kentuckybluesfestival.com. The Cincy Blues Fest takes place the same weekend and is highlighted by the appearance of Nick Moss and the Flip Tops, Big George Brock, Bettye Lavette and Walter Trout. Get the 411 at cincyblues.org. The best of the summer festivals has to be the annual Madison Ribberfest August 17 and 18. Charlie Musselwhite, Elvin Bishop, Mitch Kashmar and Duke Robillard are just a few of the heavyweights to grace this riverside festival. Don't forget this is also a major barbecue contest with no less than 40 competitors. Get more info at www.madisonribberfest.com. The Ken Lakes Hot August Blues in Hardin, KY may be the furthest away at just over 200 miles but KBS board member Bob Brown thinks it's the best setting for watching the blues. The festival features a stage next to the water that allows boats to view the bands on one side and landlubbers to take it in from the other side. Check it out at www. hotaugustbluesfestival.com

A CD release party will be held Sunday, August 5 at Lisa's Oak Street Lounge for Don "Big Daddy" Pollard. Big Daddy provides lead guitar and vocals for the Kings of Love every Tuesday night at Lisa's. The band plays a little blues, a little R&B and a lot of soul. CD's will be sold at a special price of \$12 the night of the release and the party starts at 7 pm. Lisa's is located at 1004 East Oak Street in the Germantown area.

There have been quite a few changes in the local blues jam scene recently. The jam at Vito's Place has moved from Sunday night to Wednesday at 7 to 11 pm and is hosted by Pure Gravel. The Longshot Tavern blues jam on Tuesday nights has moved to Thursday at the same time. The evening is hosted by John Burgard, Mike Lynch and Andy Brown. This move came about after Stevie Ray's restarted their blues jam on Tuesday night with the same crew from Longshots. The Wednesday jam at Lisa's Oak Street Lounge with Lamont Gillispie has moved to the Dugout 921 Swan Street. Check the KBS calendar for times and dates.

On August 16 Rory Block has a show at the Clifton Center with the Straightaway Ministries Choir. Billed as *Down at the Crossroads / Blues meets Gospel* the choir features descendants of famed bluesman Robert Johnson. The center is located at 2117 Payne Street. Tickets are \$15 each and available online at www.cliftoncenter.org. Jackson Mississippi native Zac Harmon makes his first visit to Louisville on August 26 at Stevie Ray's. A disciple of the Farish Street blues sound, same as the late, great Elmore James, Harmon will perform at 7:30 pm and tickets are \$12. The July 22 Tab Benoit show at Stevie Ray's was canceled when Tab's tour bus broke down. Manager Todd Webster informed me that the show has been rescheduled for Monday, September 10 at 8 pm. Keep up to date with all the shows at Stevie Ray's by visiting their website at www.stevieraysbluesbar.com.

Speaking of Stevie Ray's our annual blues contest will be held there on Sunday, September 30. It's not too late for blues bands to apply. Applications will be accepted until the end of the month. See the ad in this issue for more details and you can find applications online at kbsblues.org.

The Derby City BBQ Cook-Off will be held Saturday, September 1 at the Derby Park Expo Five on 7th Street Road near Churchill Downs. This is the first year of the cook-off and local municipalities and their mayors will compete for cash, prizes and best barbecue of the festival. WC Handy Festival Reviews June 9-16, 2007 Henderson, KY

Little did we know that there would be a show as well. Last year we went on the first day of the festival and saw some local bands. It was fun and the food was great.

This year, however, after learning that James Cotton was the closing act, we decided to go on Saturday the last night of the festival. We arrived around 5:30 right before Diunna Greenleaf & Blue Mercy started performing. She came out like a ball of fire! She opened with a song titled, "Tribute to John Lee Hooker." It was awesome. She had all the men in the audience drooling over her to become her next "John Lee." Now, that woman can sing the blues! She has a set of pipes on her that even without a microphone, you could hear her loud and clear. She also sang an a cappella gospel song. 

Malkum Gibson & the Mighty Juke Booked Again www.handlebarproductions.com

As I listened to this CD, I was immediately pulled in by Malkum Gibson's harp playing. The energy and style are reminiscent of some of the great bluesmen from Chicago. I easily heard the influences of B.B. King, Buddy Guy, and Sonny Terry on this live, electric blues CD.

This Midwest blues from Ohio makes you want to get up and boogie. The Mighty Jukes feature Malkum Gibson on both the harmonica and lead vocals, Rob Cole on lead guitar, John Hack on bass and Jake "The Snake" Shumaker on drums. If you like the blues and the harmonica is your passion, pick a track. You will not be disappointed.

I particularly liked Can't Hold Out, the CD's second song. It features Malkum's harmonica playing and vocals. It is crisp with just the basics; harp, guitar, and vocals. This song is classic blues that I would expect to find early in a set to get the crowd involved.

I also enjoyed the fifth song, Love the Way You Everything. This song is clearly about the beginning of a relationship as it is full of hope and optimism. As time passes, there will be another blues song about how you let me down, broke my heart, and I drank away my pain.

Travelin' Mojos Tune In (Self-Produced)

I first saw this group at the KBS Ramblin' Cruise on June 2 at Stevie Ray's. They have been around, but for us working stiffs who don't get out a lot, I had to wait for the KBS Cruise to introduce me to their music. The band hails from southern Indiana as a few of their songs reveal. For instance, a couple of songs mention places in southern Indiana (taverns in New Albany for instance or drinking wine while driving a Coupe Deville through Starlight).

This group is as much about having fun as they are about playing music. And that goes for pumping up the audience too. At the KBS Cruise, they had several people on the stage with them singing and dancing. They gave out small cans with something inside and encouraged the audience to shake them like maracas. Their songs are entertaining and humorous and... they play some blues too.

Eddy Weigleb sings and plays harp while Denny Parker plays guitar, Jerry Shupert plays drums and Richard Denison plays bass. Four of the 12 songs are Mojo originals. Two of the covers (Hold On and Use Me) don't showcase the band like some other songs could, but even these two are not bad. They are a talented group and the CD recording is good. This is a good live group so when they cross the river again, get out and see them

Erja Lyytinen Dreamland Blues Ruf Records RUF1114

Erja Lyytinen. Now, here's a name you don't hear every day. Doesn't exactly roll off the tongue, does it? Well, maybe in Finland it does: where, in fact, the young woman in question is a native and a classically-trained afficionado of the blues.

That's right: The Blues.

And, for four days in the summer of 2006, Lyytinen and the blues were synonymous as she recorded 11 tunes of this 12-song release of mostly-originals with Aynsley Lister and Ian Parker inside the Electric Catfish Studio in Oxford, Mississippi, and for one day in September 2005 recording the title track at Jimbo Mathus' Delta Recording Studio in Clarksdale, Mississippi. And, although her accent is noticeable and her singing voice is sweet and pure, it would still seem the blues always had a home inside this attractive Finlander.

On this recording, she collaborates with Mississippi Hill Country bluesmen David and Kinney Kimbrough (sons of legendary artist Junior Kimbrough) on bass and drums respectively, as well as European rhythm guitarist Davide Floreno. Lyytinen contributes an authentic down 'n' dirty slide guitar that belies her appearance and academic background. When she straps on a guitar and lays the slide on the strings, she OWNS the blues.

The opener, a Lyytinen original titled "Skinny Girl," shows just that, and adds a little rock 'n' roll to the mix on this gutsy, up-beat, rapid-fire instrumental that has her slide finger dancing all over the guitar neck. Not only is she fast, she's quick -- her sense of timing is impeccable. This isn't an easy task with a slide. Her tone is fat and warm and it resonates throughout the song. Lyytinen also takes Elmore James' "It Hurts Me Too," played at a near-snail's crawl -- just like the original tune so many decades ago -- and makes it her own. The rhythm section keeps the pace in a perfect slow burn cadence on this Chicago blues standard and while Lyytinen sings, you can even forgive her accent, because the spirit of the song is faithfully kept intact - with the exception of a bit more slide than on the original. All that just proves the young woman's guitar provess even more.

"Good Lovin' Man" is another of her original tunes, although she's borrowed heavily from Elmore James, et. al, with a standard I, IV, V chord progression sounding a lot like a "Dust My Broom" clone. Once again, however, Lyytinen adds just the right dose of some tasty extra slide licks for some stimuilating listening as a bonus. She also shows that her command of a fat-sounding slide vibrato is second to none.

The last few tracks are a bit slower in cadence, and Lyytinen's vocals are a bit blusier, duskier, smokier -- sounding more authentic. On the title track, the slow swing beat conjures up scenes of smoke-filled juke joints, sweat-soaked patrons on the dance floor and a guitarist moving fluidly and sensually to the beat onstage. This is one sweet tune! Oh, yes -- it includes a tastefully and skillfully-played slide, too.

Finland might not be the "home of the blues," but Erja Lyytinen has given it a home in her artful slide guitar playing and in her soul. Hopefully there'll be a lot more blues from this young woman.

Billy Gibson Band Live at Rum Boogie Café Daddy-O Records

The Rum Boogie Café, on Beale Street in Memphis, has been open since 1986. This establishment received the Keeping The Blues Alive Award from the Blues Foundation in 2007. One of the signs on the Café says it all- "Eat, Drink, Boogie, Repeat".

The Billy Gibson Band was the House band there for nearly 6 years. The band consists of Billy Gibson on harp and vocals, David Bowen on Guitar, James Jackson on bass, and Cedric Keel on drums. Gibson is a 2005 Beale Street Entertainer of the Year, a 2006 Blues Music Award Nominee and was featured on the BBC's *Destination Music*.

Two of the songs on the CD are Gibson originals, and the others are covers such as Willie Dixon's "Pretty Thing", Tony Jo White's "Polk Salad Annie" and John Lee Williamson's "Early in the Morning". Probably the most interesting song is "Home at Last (aka Country Girl)". It is a funk-infused blues song with a bass solo that ends the song. Gibson is a talented harpist and his blowing can be subdued or boisterous. There is one song on the CD, "Bad Boy" that is 16 minutes long. On that song, Gibson does let his harp do some dancing. The bass lines in this song are again funky. There is a very long drum solo(over 5 minutes), and harp solos as well as Gibson talking to the audience during the song. That song doesn't go over as well on a CD as it might live. Three of the other songs on the CD are 8, 9 and 11 minutes long which can get somewhat boring on a CD.

All in all the CD has some good music on it, but the songs should be limited in their time. I must admit that I am somewhat biased with regard to Polk Salad Annie. It is 11 minutes long and I thought it should be more on the order of 11 seconds. No offence to Gibson, but I would rather have a more bluesy song extended to such a length.

Julie Black Call Me Angel for Blues Boia Records

"Liberating and exciting...so inviting..." From those first gritty, smoky words on the opening tune, youthful Floridabased vocalist Julie Black will get your attention and hold you under her spell.

"Bigger Fool for Me", the best of the 12 original tunes on this CD, is Black's signature sound -- or at least it seems it should be. Swampy, hip-shaking with spooky slide guitar (Mark Murray) and wailing blues harp (D.W. Gill), Black belts this one out with authority. Producer Bob Langford has apparently recognized the young woman's easy vocal power (she never seems to strain, no matter how strong the effort), and keeps her out front where she belongs. In fact, Black's emotional, passionate singing anchors the entire recording.

While slinky, swampy blues seem to be her forte, Black can handle jazz-style tunes with equal skill and grace. Listen to "Feelin' Strange," a finger-snapping swinger where she takes her voice down a notch and smooths things out nicely, skillfully accompanied by jazz-style guitar playing from Murray and Dave Eichenberger and the rhythm section of bassist Bill Spicuglia and drummer Mike Thomas. She mixes both jazz and blues in the toe-tapping "My Doggie Don't," with Gill's arching alto saxophone giving it just the right mood. In fact, she does this on several of the CD's songs -- and does it very well.

Other great tunes include the sandpaper & silk of "Blues Like Me," the slow-dance juke-joint "Love this Mama," the quick-paced "Broken-Hearted Baby" (with some nice keyboarding by Michael Johnn and high-note, single-string slide from Murray), the powerfully sung and emotional "Go & Get Her" and the closing tune "Lean In On Me."

Actually, there's only one tune on here which doesn't really "work," and that's the rapid-fire boogie-style "Spreadin' the Blues," due to the fact there are too many syllables and words for the music. The song just feels out of place, in general.

Lyrically, there's potential here. Most of these songs are about love, what it feels like to be rejected, to feel stupid, to feel intensely desired, guilty, and just plain blue. To illustrate how she describes the blues, listen to "Blues Like Me" again and pay attention to the words: "I been passed around, I been branded. I been struck down, and left stranded. Ain't nobody got the blues like me. Born imperfect, undesired. I've been running; my legs are tired. Ain't nobody got the blues like me." Not bad -- better than your average standard blues lyric. And, as noted in the beginning of this review, the CD's opener also has some pretty good lyrics: "Liberating and exciting, your love is so inviting. I should've turned around and never said a thing..."

For the most part, there are only things to like about this CD. On a few occasions, the production gets just a tad "messy" or "soft" and it gets a bit unclear just precisely what's happening. Backup vocals could possibly have been better utilized (didn't seem to fit the genre) and there were a few brief instances where Black's youth caused a bit of a vocal "break" or an inability to hold the note dead on.

Black is a young woman born to sing, that much is certain. She seems comfortable and is finding her roots -- which appear to go very, very, very deep. Florida will have to share her with the rest of us.

Kenny Wayne Shepherd 10 Days Out: Blues from the Backroads Reprise Records 49294

This 2006 release from Reprise Records is a 57-minute-long DVD documenting interviews and performances by some of the greatest blues legends. The DVD was produced and narrated by Kenny Wayne Shepherd, the young and up-and-coming blues guitar hotshot who played with Stevie Ray Vaughan. According to Shepherd, the goal of the documentary is to celebrate the blues as the only truly American art form. Much of the action takes place in a church in Salinas, Kansas, where Shepherd and his crew invite many of the artists featured on this DVD to perform for the purpose of recording them playing with Shepherd. Other scenes are shot on location in New Orleans; Indianola, Mississippi; Gadsen, Alabama; and Hillsborough and Morgantown, North Carolina. Featured artists include Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown, Bryan Lee, Buddy Flett, B.B. King, Jerry "Boogie"

McCain, Cootie Stark, Neal "Big Daddy" Pattman, Etta Baker, Hubert Sumlin, George "Wild Child" Butler, Calvin "Fuzz" Jones, Pinetop Perkins, Lazy Lester, and Bob Margolin.


The DVD contains many enjoyable moments, including some really great performances, amusing anecdotes, and nuggets of wisdom dispensed by the artists. The most memorable performances feature Shepherd playing acoustic guitar with Etta Baker in her home and with Buddy Flett at the side of Huddie "Leadbelly" Ledbetter's grave, Jerry "Boogie" McCain performing in Gadsen, Cootie Stark and Neal "Big Daddy" Pattman playing in Hillsborough, and Hubert Sumlin and Pinetop Perkins playing in the church in Salinas with the Howlin' Wolf Band and the Muddy Waters Band. I also really enjoyed Hubert Sumlin reminiscing about his relationship with Howlin' Wolf, who told him to put away his guitar pick and play with his fingers.

Sometimes the sound quality is fuzzy, and the camera work can be jumpy and unfocused. But these shortcomings don't detract from the experience too much and actually give the DVD a lively, documentary feel. A more serious shortcoming is Shepherd's gross self-indulgence. The main focus is more a tribute to him than to the greats he is supposedly documenting. The camera lingers lovingly on Shepherd, and his loud flashy solos are prominently highlighted. Also distracting is the fact that some of the performances aren't even complete. We hear only parts of the songs performed by Gatemouth Brown, Bryan Lee, B.B. King, and Boogie McCain. Even Hubert Sumlin is given short shrift despite his nonchalant virtuosity, which leaves Shepherd sounding like a rank amateur. The DVD would have been much better if Shepherd had let the music speak for itself more and removed himself as the main focus. Even so, the documentary is an important record of the styles, thoughts, and feelings of many of our nation's great blues artists. There are moments of real charm in this DVD, such as Etta Baker's sweet smile as she talks about her deep love for the music.

The documentary ends with tributes to the artists who passed on since the completion of the documentary, including Wild Child Butler, Big Daddy Pattman, Gatemouth Brown, Cootie Stark, and Etta Baker. This sad ending underlines Shepherd's view that we should treasure the blues and blues artists as a part of history. They are part of our national heritage. All too soon, we will be forced to reminisce about these great artists instead of being able to see them perform live.

Ronnie Baker Brooks June 3, 2007 Stevie Ray's Blues Bar




The day after the annual Blues Cruise by the KBS, a National Act blew into town and landed at Stevie Ray's. Ronnie Baker Brooks, son on Lonnie Brooks brought his band into town to show his stuff. The last time Ronnie was in Louisville, he was the opening act for Buddy Guy at the Brown Theater. At that show, he wowed the audience with his guitar prowess and showed that he can grab as much attention as the veteran Buddy Guy.

This night was no different as Ronnie immediately took control of the audience. Stevie Ray's had a good crowd- about 90% full. Ronnie paid homage to the greats, Albert King, Buddy Guy and of course his father. He has worked with these and many more and played some tunes that would make these guys proud. He told the audience that his dad taught him everything that Ronnie knows, but not everything his dad knows.

Towards the end of his act, Ronnie put on his wireless guitar transmitter and headed for the bar. Without missing a lick, he picked up a Bacardi Rum bottle, used it for his slide on the guitar and then he mixed himself a rum and coke and proceeded to drink it, while still playing-behind his back. What a showman!

Ronnie plays with intensity and always plays for the audience. His facial expressions and comments directed at the crowd made everyone there appreciate the man's talent and charisma. The music he plays is true blues mixed with blues rock-something for everybody.

He showed it too, as each time he hit the mark, a broad smile emanated from the behind the drum kit. At the end of the show he was ecstatic as the audience congratulated him on a great performance. It is nice to see a young musician like "C.J" do so good a job. There is a bright future for this man.
